Course objectives

This course introduces students to concepts, methods and policy options in managing the environment using tools of economic analysis. This course should be accessible to anyone with an analytical mind and familiarity with basic concepts of economics. Since several environmental problems are caused by economic activity (for instance, carbon emissions, over harvesting of renewable resources and air and water pollution as a by-product of industrial activity), this course examines different approaches to adjusting behaviour through economic institutions such as markets and incentives as well as through regulation, etc.

Key environmental issues and problems, economic way of thinking about these problems, basic concepts from economics; Pareto optimality and market failure in the presence of externalities; property rights and other approaches.

2. The Design and Implementation of Environmental Policy

Overview, Pigouvian taxes and effluent fees, tradable permits, implementation of environmental policies in India and international experience; transboundary environmental problems; economics of climate change.

3. Environmental Valuation Methods and Applications

Valuation of non-market goods and services--theory and practice; measurement methods; cost-benefit analysis of environmental policies and regulations.

Concepts; measurement; perspectives from Indian experience

Course Name: Biodiversity and Environment Conservation II (AEC) Course Code: AECE55002

Course objectives

- To gain knowledge about the environment and its conservation along with sustainable development.
- To apply the concepts and principles of environmental science to propose solutions to specific environmental problems.
- To analyze environmental writings and predictions and their impact on subsequent developments in human relationship with the environment.
- To evaluate the adequacy of conclusions about environmental phenomena.

Course Outline:

Unit I: Biodiversity and Conservation

Levels of biological diversity: genetic, species and ecosystem diversity; Biogeographic zones of India; Biodiversity patterns and global biodiversity hot spots India as a mega-biodiversity nation; Endangered and endemic species of India. Threats to biodiversity: Habitat loss, poaching of wildlife, man-wildlife conflicts, biological invasions; Conservation of biodiversity: In-situ and Ex-situ conservation of biodiversity. Ecosystem and biodiversity services: Ecological, economic, social, ethical, aesthetic and Informational value.

Unit II: Environmental Pollution

Environmental pollution: types, causes, effects, and controls; Air, water, soil, and noise pollution Nuclear hazards and human health risks, Solid waste management: Control measures of urban and industrial waste. Pollution case studies.

Environmental Policies & Practices: Sustainability and sustainable development. Climate change, global warming, ozone layer depletion, acid rain, and impacts on human communities and agriculture. Environment Laws: Environment Protection Act; Air (Prevention & Control of Pollution) Act; Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act; Wildlife Protection Act; Forest Conservation Act. Nature reserves, tribal populations and rights, and human-wildlife conflicts in the Indian context.

Unit III: Human Communities and the Environment

Human population growth: Impacts on environment, human health and welfare. Resettlement and rehabilitation of project-affected persons; case studies. Disaster management: floods, earthquakes, cyclones, and landslides. Environmental movements: Chipko, Silent Valley, Bishnois of Rajasthan. Environmental ethics: Role of Indian and other religions and cultures in environmental conservation. Environmental communication and public awareness, case studies (e.g., CNG vehicles in Delhi).

Fieldwork; Visit an area to document environmental assets: river/ forest/ flora/fauna, etc. Visit to a local polluted site-Urban/Rural/Industrial/Agricultural. Study of common plants, insects, birds, and basic principles of identification. Study of simple ecosystems-pond, river, Delhi Ridge, etc.
