First women badge at Naval Armament Inspectorate

In a first, Indian Navy inducted Shubhangi Swaroop as its first woman pilot. Swaroop was among four women officers who had passed out of the Ezhimala Naval Academy in Kerala. The other three women officers are Aastha Segal, Roopa A and Sakthimaya S. These three women cadets were inducted at the Naval Armament Inspectorate (NAI), where no female officer has ever worked. The NAI branch looks after the inspection and assessment of the arms and weapons of the country's naval force.
