



“Non- Aligned India: The only hope to prevent World War”

The Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) provided a platform for the newly independent developing nations to join together and protect their autonomy. India had adopted this policy because of both political as well as geographical reasons.

- **Why NAM is Important in today's world?**

Non-alignment served India well during the difficult years from the mid to the late 20th century and this policy will be beneficial for India in the near future. It is said that this Non- Alignment Policy has outlived its utility and NAM is losing its relevance in uni-polar world but we should not forget that there are some

policies which had never outlived their utility and by the present situations we can understand that the world is again moving towards bi-polarity, one led by US and other by China-Russia. NAM acted as the protector of third-world countries who had been exploited by the developed nations.

Non-aligned India acted like a factor of balancing power between two super powers of the world and it can do the same thing if required in the future. During the cold war era, the NAM played a vital role in stabilizing the world order and preserving peace and security. Non alignment of NAM doesn't mean the neutrality of state on global issues; rather it always meant a peaceful intervention in world politics. It should be seen as “Strategic Autonomy”, which is the need of the hour in today's world. The principles of NAM can guide the nations towards it.

Even our Vice President Venkaiah Naidu in 18th Summit NAM, said that it has played an important role in promoting global peace and security; also served as a forum for India to articulate its views on global nuclear disarmament and the discriminatory nature of the global nuclear order at the centre of which stood the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

As NAM represents two third members of the UN general assembly, its members act as important vote blocking group in UN. Even though NAM may not have the political, economic and military strength to successfully resist powerful nations but still it carries enough pressure to question the legitimacy of many acts of developed nations as seen during Tehran Summit in 2012 where NAM Nations criticized the attempts of western world to isolate Iran and punish it with unilateral sanctions. Though India has made it clear that it needs Non-Alignment not just to preserve its strategic autonomy, but to mobilize developing countries on the basis of common interest.

No matter the world is bipolar or multi-polar, non-alignment as a foreign policy of the small or weak states will continue to remain valid as long as the sovereign states exist. “Non-Alignment will continue to be the fundamental basis of our approach to world problems and our relations with other countries”

- **Why NAM is losing its relevance?**

The 55 years old Non-Aligned Movement, one powerful bloc of independent nations, is dying and nobody is sending flowers. During cold war, non-aligned was a policy for newly independent developing nations to maintain their sovereignty. But after the cold war this policy has lost its relevance because the world has changed dramatically from the time it was conceived. For a few years now, NAM has not been proposed by our policymakers as a principle of India's foreign policy.

At a time of grave worldwide crises, Mr. Narendra Modi has used all platforms available in India to position it as a nation that can speak of global concerns. Towards existing platform NAM has been used by Modi in the same way in which he has used newer groupings like G20, Quad.

We can speculate it from India's external affair minister's speech when he said that-“non-alignment was a term of a political era.” It is an ideological burden of the past. According to him this approach of neutralism is responsible for many setbacks and compromises for India. Given India's current security predicament, it can't afford to be non-aligned in the traditional sense of the term as it will have to build partnership with like-minded countries for building its capacities. As we see, in the wake of stand-off with China, there have been calls for India's foreign policy to make decisive shift. Apart from that, India has used its decisive mandate to form a new partnership with US for domestic development agenda. In a nut shell, today's India and its aspirations demand much more from its leadership.



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
Two day Orientation Day 2020

So just **KEEP CALM, THINK HEALTHY, and STAY HAPPY.**



The Right to Information Bill

The Right to Information Bill was introduced in the Lok Sabha in December 2004. It was passed by both houses of Parliament with major amendments in May 2005. The assent of the President was received on June 15 and the Act was notified in the Gazette on June 21. This law became operational by mid-October 2005. It was passed by Parliament to enable citizens to exercise their fundamental right to information held by public authorities all over the country (except Jammu and Kashmir). The RTI Act aims to bring about transparency in the functioning of public authorities, contain corruption and hold Governments and their instrumentalities accountable to people. It creates a process for providing information to people. The RTI Act places a duty on officers to provide information to people both proactively and upon request. It provides for a two-tier appeals mechanism to deal with complaints of unreasonable denial of information by public authorities. This law will have an overriding effect vis-a-vis the Official Secrets Act, 1923 and all other laws and orders passed by Governments that restrict information flow to people.

Child Care leave

Union minister Jitendra Singh has announced child care leave for male government employees if they are raising the child alone.

Child Care Leave is generally granted to women employees. This can be for a period of maximum two years during the entire service before their child reaches the age of 18. It is treated as earned leave. But it may not be granted more than thrice in the same year. Out of the total 730 days of leave, employees get full salary during the first 365 days and 80 per cent of the salary in the next 365 days.


Who will qualify as a single, male government servant eligible for this leave?

- *Widower
- * Divorcee
- *unmarried male government services.

An employee on child care leave may leave the headquarters with the prior approval of the competent authority i.e. Leave Travel Concession (LTC) may be availed by the employee even if he is on child care leave.

In case of a disabled child, the condition that child care leave can be availed by the parents only till the child reaches 22 years of age has been removed. Now, it can be availed at any point of time.

The aim is to bring ease-of-living for government servants.
