Corruption

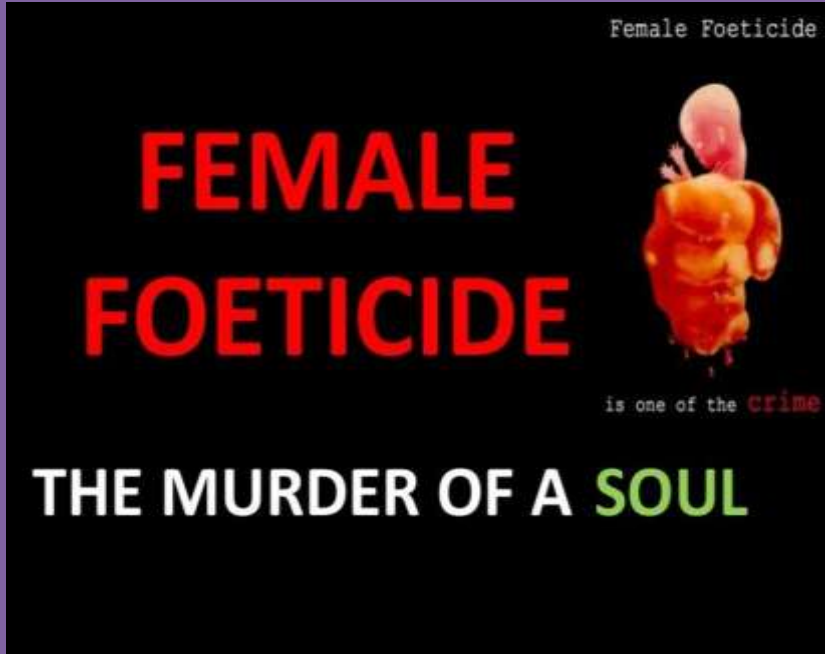

FEMALE FOETICIDE

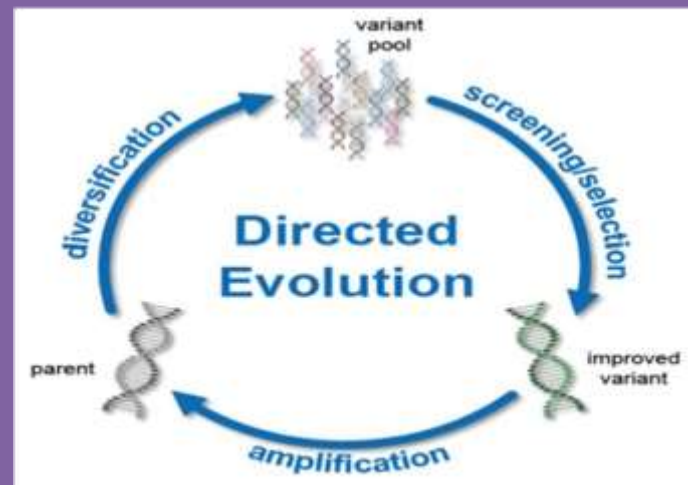

TEST TUBE EVOLUTION



2018's Nobel Prize in Chemistry has been awarded to three scientists who developed laboratory method of controlling evolution and harnessing its power to engineer enzymes and binding proteins-using the same tools as nature, of genetic mutation and selection. This is called "Directed evolution" a man made procedure that compresses the evolution timescale by orders of magnitude down to a few years, much less than breeding time scales to produce new enzymes and proteins in the laboratory that are useful for human survival. The notion of "Survival of the fittest" in nature's scheme of things mimicked in the laboratory through Directed Evolution to create new useful entities. Frances H. Arnold, a professor of chemical, engineering, bioengineering and biochemistry at the California Institute of Technology is the only woman to get the Chemistry Nobel Prize. The other two Scientists awarded with Nobel Prize are George P. Smith and Sir Gregory P. Winter. In the Process of Directed Evolution random mutations are introduced in the gene for the enzyme that will be changed. The genes are then inserted into the bacteria, which uses them as templates and produce randomly mutated enzymes. The changed enzymes are further tested. Those that are most efficient at catalyzing the desired chemical reaction are selected. At last new random mutations are introduced in the genes for the selected enzymes. The cycle begins again.
