The response of the staff was very good. The students learnt many new things & enjoyed it.



ABOUT THE SESSION

It is important for a woman when she work outside that she is safeguarded by the organization in which she is working. The Session on "Sexual Harassment at Workplace" is taken just to aware all the faculties whether they are male or female to make them aware about the harassment of the women at workplace. In this session the detailed discussion was held for what is harassment, kinds of harassment at the workplace and legalities of sexual harassment at the workplace.

Ms. Zaiba khan Assistant Professor of Computer Science initiate the session by telling the harassment and its kind, she said Harassment may be mentally or physically of a woman so we should not make any kind of gesture posture which harasses a woman even sending text messages, whatsapp, e-mails which makes a woman uncomfortable is called harassment. Then she talked about the range of harassing behavior she said :- physical conduct, verbal conduct and non-verbal conduct if harassing a woman is considered as harassment , there may be psychological harassment , internet harassment lastly she concluded by telling that what impact it does to the woman who is working outside her home.

Then Ms. Bindiya Tater Associate Professor of School of Commerce & Management talk about the preventive measure what precautionary measures should be taken by the organization to cease these kind of harassment at the work place, like the CCTV cameras at every place, Creating an atmosphere conducive to increased participation of women, positively encouraging and supporting them, Identification documents (driving license, photo ID, address proof, Fingerprints) to be collected from drivers, security guards and all casual staff, regular reminders of the ethical values of the company, through email, posters, sessions, etc.Provide training to all women employees and educate them about the rights and facilitie and awareness of the company policies on harassment, on gender discrimination or gender biased approach and the complaint process.

Ms. Sofia Kausar Assistant Professor of Law tell the legalities of the Sexual Harassment and its punishment. She said :- Sexual Harassment at workplace is a crime under section 354 IPC and it is also a non-bailable offence. It is must for every organization for have a Committee which can lookafter these matters as given under Sexual Harassment Act, 2013. The Punishment under the IPC is from one to two three years . She also told the procedure how and where a woman can complaint. She also discussed the very important case on this aspect i.e Vishaka v. State of Rajasthan, this case was the first case before the Indian Judiciary regarding Sexual Harassment at Workplace.

The discussion is all about the general awareness among the staff of the organization regarding harassment at workplace. It is mandatory for every organization to have a committee for the protection of women so that she will feel secure and can have inclusive growth of her.

Introduction:

RNB Global University has organized a free Eye test camp on 04.03.3030 – 07.03.2020. The doctors brought well-equipped eye examination tools to examine the students effectively.

About the International Mother Language Day:

International Mother Language Day is celebrated every year on 21st February. The main purpose of celebrating this day is to promote the awareness of language and cultural diversity across the world. It was first announced by UNESCO on November 17, 1999. Since then it is being celebrated every year. The date represents the day 21st February 1952 when four young students were killed in Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh, because of Bengali and Urdu language controversy. Languages are the most powerful way to preserve and develop culture and to promote it across the world. Because of this unfortunate incident, International Mother Language Day is celebrated in all over the world, while it is a public holiday in Bangladesh.

PROCEEDING OF THE CELEBRATION:

- 1. At the outset, anchor & convener of the celebration Mr. Ashok Prem explain the objects & history of International Mother Language Day. He told that in 1947 at the time of partition of Pakistan, the province Bengal was divided into two parts: the western part became India and the eastern part is known as East Bengal which was later known as East Pakistan. At that time there were many economic, social and cultural issues including linguistic issue. In 1948 when government announced Urdu as the national language, it sparked the protest among the Bengali speaking majority of Pakistan. The protest got out of control and ended with the death of four protestors of the University of Dhaka who were shot by the police. The students' deaths during the fight for their mother language are now remembered as The International Mother Language Day.
- 2. After that Dr. Rohit kumar Mishra from school of Basic & Applied Science (SOBAS) explained that Kalidas was a One of the greatest poets and dramatists in Sanskrit. His chronicle of the kings of the Raghu clan ('Raghuvamsha'), the great play 'Shakuntala' and other works depict, through many great characters, the highest ideals of life as seen by the ancient people of Bharat. There are hundreds of languages in the world. However, great and classical literature which people in all countries need to read is found only in a few languages. One such great language is Sanskrit. It is one of the oldest languages. It is the mother of several Indian languages such as Hindi, Bengali and Marathi in the North. Kannada, Telugu and other languages in the South have also been nourished by it.
- 3. Then Mr. Ravi Kumar from the field of computer science, discussed that Tamil literature refers to the literature in the Tamil language. Tamil literature has a rich and long literary tradition spanning more than two thousand years. The oldest extant works show signs of maturity indicating an even longer period of evolution. Contributors to the Tamil literature are mainly from Tamil people from South India, including the land now comprising Tamil Nadu, and the Sri Lankan Tamils from Sri Lanka, as well as the Tamil diaspora. The history of Tamil literature follows the history of Tamil Nadu, closely following the social, political and cultural trends of various periods. The early Sangam literature, Kurunthogai, Natrinai are dated before 300 BC, contain anthologies of various poets dealing with many aspects of life, including love, war, social values and religion.
- 4. Ms. Sofia kausar ,Assistant Professor of School of Law told that In India, it is one of 22 constitutionally recognized official languages, having official status in the five states of Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand and West Bengal, as well as the national capital territory of Delhi. As both registers are composed of the same Indo-Aryan vocabulary base, colloquial Urdu is largely mutually intelligible with colloquial Hindi, with the two registers being grouped together as Hindustani or Hindi-Urdu. With respect to literary vocabulary, however, formal Urdu draws heavily from Persian vocabulary and requires knowledge of some simple Persian grammatical structures, while formal Hindi heavily draws from Sanskrit for its formal and technical vocabulary.
- As the last speaker of celebration Ms. Lata Vyas stated about the English language and literature, she sung an English song also.
- Convener of the event Mr. ashok Prem paid thanks to all participant and audience.

COMPETITION RULES for KITE FLYING

The following rules shall be applied during the Kite Flying Competition .

- 1. A team should consist of two members only.
- 2. Chinese Manja (thread), Kevlar, metal, or coated cutting line is prohibited.
- 3. Kites may be flown on only one single line. Line used must be of an appropriate type that can be cut. The Head Judge will have the authority to disallow any improper flying line or disqualify contestants using it.
- 4. The Head Judge will designate a maximum length of line for the competition.
- 5. Contestants launch to fly their kites on a signal given by the Head Judge. Once kites are ready to fly, the Head Judge will announce that the contest has begun and kites may be ready to fly.
- 6. Kites are eliminated when cut or grounded for any reason.
- 7. 8. Once grounded, fliers should take all appropriate steps to remove their line from the field and not interrupt the continuing competition.
- 8. Contestants are required to compete by maintaining the harmony of the event.
- 9. Interested students apply on eventforum@rnbglobal.edu.in before 12.00 Noon (14.01.2020)

FIRST ROUND

10 highest kites, flying for 20 minutes on a predetermined length of line will be selected for the next round.

SECOND ROUND

5 highest kites, flying for 20 minutes on a predetermined length of line will be selected for the next round.

FINAL ROUND:

3 highest kites, flying for 15 minutes on a predetermined length of line will be selected for the next round.

SCORING METHOD:

Points are awarded to the final three kites. The last kite remaining in a heat will receive 5 points. The second and third, kites will receive 4, and 3 points respectively.


GENERAL RULES

Safety and Sportsmanship:

- 1. Safety should be considered the primary concern.
- The head judge may stop the competition on the basis of safety issues.
- 3. Contestants shall conduct themselves in a safe and sportsmanlike manner.
- 4. They shall not disrupt competition in any way, intentionally or unintentionally, threaten the safety of other contestants or spectators, or seek to influence the Judges.
- 5. Contestants acting in an unsafe or disruptive manner shall be disqualified by the Event Coordinator or Head Judge Wind Rule and Line Length:
- 6. The head judge shall have the authority to suspend or cancel heats, rounds, or entire events based on wind conditions and safety considerations.
- 7. A "preflight" or "pilot's" meeting will be held before each contest. Fliers, judges, and field crew should attend. Introduction

Rotary Club Aadhya, in collaboration with RNB Global University, organized a Plantation Drive at Government Higher Secondary School, Husangsar Village, Bikaner. Conclusion



Conclusion

The Plantation Drive at Raisar Village, Bikaner, organized by Rotary Club Aadhya and RNB Global University, was a commendable effort toward environmental conservation and community development. By planting trees, raising awareness, and involving the local community, the initiative contributed to both the ecological and social well-being of the area. 



About the Group: Jana Natya Manch

Jana Natya Manch, established in 1973 by a group of Delhi's young theatre radicals including Safdar Hashmi, is India's best-known political street theatre group. The group has to its credit over 100 street, proscenium, and other performances, totalling over 8,000 performances. Its productions have been written and/or directed by a number of leading theatre artistes, including Habib Tanvir, Safdar Hashmi, Govind Deshpande, Anuradha Kapur, M.K. Raina, Kavita Nagpal, Abhishek Majumdar, Sudhanva Deshpande and Brijesh. Janam has performed in over 250 villages, towns and cities all over India, as well as performed, lectured and offered workshops in Palestine, South Africa, the UK and USA. Janam has neither sought, nor accepted, funding from government, corporates, NGOs or political parties. It is funded by its audiences, and Janam members volunteer their time gratis

The Group will present two Play (Girgit and Machine) and conduct an illustrated talk on street theatre In the Seminar Hall.

Synopsis: Machine

This is Janam's first street play, first performed in October 1978. It's a stark riveting critique of capitalism with lyrical, stylized dialogues that depict the exploitation of industrial labour.

Machine was written by Safdar Hashmi and Rakesh Saksena, and was finalised on the floor, where everyone present contributed. The machine, created very simply by human figures, is the symbolic representation of capitalism. The worker, the capitalist and the security officer are all parts of the machine; they are complementary parts of a system founded upon the exploitation of one by the other; their co-existence, then, is unequal.
